WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the **BOCES** operates a Natural Resource Science program for local high school students that includes work-based learning experiences.

WHEREAS, the **Village** owns and operates recreational facilities at Mount Pisgah Park as well as other Village owned property.

WHEREAS, within Mount Pisgah Park as well as other Village owned property exists forest lands of substantial value to the Village and the community.

WHEREAS, the aforesaid forest lands and the wildlife contained therein would benefit from comprehensive study and management.

WHEREAS, **BOCES** students are trained in the use of **New York State Logger Safety and Silviculture Management Guidelines**.

NOW, THEREFORE, the **Village of Saranac Lake** and the **BOCES**, agree upon the terms and conditions hereinafter set forth, as follows:

SCOPE OF WORK:

1. BOCES shall be responsible for:

- a. Defining "plots" within the park to serve as Silviculture plots. Each plot will subsequently be managed using the aforementioned New York State Guidelines.
- b. A complete silviculture analysis of each plot will be completed. This analysis will be based on industry approved forest mensuration calculations which will contain recommendation for both short-term and long-term remediation to best ensure forest and wildlife health.
- c. Identifying trees that are unsafe, due to disease or other health issues and where applicable, provide a risk assessment using a format developed by the **International Society of Arboriculture** of any trees that pose a risk to roads or trails.
- d. The **BOCES** agrees not to assign this Agreement or sub-let the premises in whole or in part without prior written consent of the **Village**.
- e. During the term of this Agreement, the **BOCES** will maintain Workers' Compensation for all **BOCES** employees, and Public Liability insurance having a minimum coverage of ONE MILLION DOLLARS and 00/cents (\$1,000,000.00) for personal injury and property damage for each occurrence. **BOCES** agrees to defend and indemnify the **Village** against any suit for or award of damages resulting from the negligence of the **BOCES**, its employees, contractors, subcontractors or agents.



Hi, could you please print me three copies of this speech, one in large font so I can read it aloud tonight at the village board meeting. I'll stop and pick them up when I'm done with work (3 ish)

Here's my speech. Here is what I would like to say.

I was late to the party. Literally. I was on my way to the meeting place, at 9:15 instead of 9, and all I knew was that we were going to do something publicly anti racist as an answer to the recent hate speech. On my way, I saw two masked people hanging up flyers. I stopped, put on my mask, approached them and said, "I think I'm headed to where you're coming from." They graciously informed me that the group had already dispersed, in sets of two, on a mission to plaster the town with these flyers. I was given a handful of flyers, and told the direction my sister was last seen going. So I got back on my bike and went to find her. I helped put up some flyers. Then we found the chalk. I've always liked using sidewalks as a canvas, because that way you can share your creative energy with the whole town. So we went to town with the chalk. Literally.

But, this time, it was different. It wasn't about me or my creative energy. This time We were writing a message to a specific group of people within our community. This time the chalking was not for fun. No- it was an act of desperation.

I, like many others, have been watching events unfold in the past years and especially the past few months with increasing anxiety and fury. Furious at the fallacy of values that I once believed our country stood for- the values I was taught, in Saranac Lake's own school system, that in this country we are all equal and free, that criminals are punished when caught, whether they have money or not. That when faced with gross injustice and corruption of power, We the People are able to change things for the better.

There was also a lot that I was never taught. Well, my eyes have opened, and what I see is that it is My responsibility to educate Myself. And is my responsibility to advocate for my fellow citizens, especially those who have suffered within a system that has unfairly given advantage to people like myself.

My first act as an ally was to help build and hang a large banner that said BLACK LIVES MATTER on the overpass. That was the night before the big rally in riverside park. I wanted everyone who comes into Saranac Lake to know that we give a shit about black lives here! And guess what, that banner was taken down the next day. Now I know that if we had applied for a permit first, that banner might not have been taken down- at least not by village officials. Live and learn.

Back to the chalk. An act of desperation. Desperation caused by the realization that the racists in my hometown are better at making their voices heard than we are. When I saw hate speech painted on our roads, when I saw confederate flags flying in our village, my blood boiled. I know you feel the same. All of us here do. So I say to you, we Cannot Allow the bigoted voices in our community to be the loudest voices. We have a responsibility to the precious few members of our community who are minorities, who are disadvantaged, who are suffering. We must stand up. Not to say that we care, but to actually do something about it. Words are just words. We

need do better.

I am late to the party. There is so much work to be done, and there are people here who have been doing that work, who have educated themselves. You are all way ahead of me in so many ways. But I'm here now, and I'm not going anywhere. I offer my voice to the cause, and all of You have my love and support for this Village Effort to achieve a decidedly different way of life.

My name is Chris Morris, and I live in Saranac Lake. I will be brief in my comments as there are a number of people signed up to speak. I want to reiterate the main points brought to the village board in two letters submitted for the record, dated July 10 and July 12. This is a time to strongly and swiftly denounce racism in Saranac Lake and our surrounding communities, in whatever form it takes. I believe the board has heard this message and I have faith that our elected officials will be proactive in addressing messages of hate. In addition, I'd like to state that while symbolic messages of love and support are undoubtedly a good thing, it will take much more work to build a truly inclusive community. There are a number of organizations in Saranac Lake and the Adirondacks working on racial and transformational justice, each bringing something different to the table. I hope the board will be proactive in reaching out to these groups - the Adirondack Diversity Initiative, High Peaks DSA, Sunrise, North Country SURJ, John Brown Lives, the Alliance for Family Justice. These are just a few organizations, and I would be happy to provide a full list with descriptions of each organization and contact info. While some of these organizations actively communicate with the board, I stress that it is not the responsibility of these organizations to reach out. Thank you for your time.

To: Saranac Lake Village Board of Trustees

On the evening of Thursday, July 9, a group of Saranac Lake residents took to downtown Saranac Lake to spread messages of love and support for Black people in our community. This action was a direct response to the racism, hate, and vitriol targeting Adirondack Diversity Initiative Director Nicky Hylton-Patterson following the news that she will move out of Saranac Lake to an undisclosed location where she feels safe. Much of this took place in the comment section of the *Adirondack Daily Enterprise* Facebook page, and it offers clear evidence that racism exists here.

To be clear: We believe Hylton-Patterson. The threats that coincided with the Black Lives Matter rally in early June and the racist graffiti spray-painted on the train tracks over the Saranac River were, undoubtedly, either direct or indirect messages aimed at Hylton-Patterson as well as other Black people in Saranac Lake. We support her decision to move; we do not question the validity of her fears, nor do we question the lived experiences of Black people, people of color, or anyone in this community from a diverse background.

We are troubled and disappointed that less than 12 hours after we circulated posters around the village and wrote messages on the sidewalks along Main Street and Broadway, individuals who have been identified as working for the village swiftly washed away the chalk and began removing posters. This stands in stark contrast to the racist graffiti that was allowed to linger for weeks, and was only covered up by citizens who took the initiative to do so — not the public officials who we entrust to keep our community safe.

We want to know if the removal of the chalk messages and flyers was a directive from the village board.

Consider this again: messages of love and support, posted using means that are not permanent nor hurt the environment, are taken down rapidly, while spray paint was left in place as a continuing reminder that Black people are not welcome here.

We understand issues of jurisdiction; sidewalks and street lights are village property, whereas the train corridor belongs to the state. But in moments like this, where our actions in response to racism must be swift and unwavering, bureaucracy should take a backseat to doing the right thing, especially in light of the slow response by our elected officials and community leaders to condemn the racist graffiti.

Now is not the time to be defensive. It is not the time to make excuses. It is time to act. We want people to feel safe here. We want people to know the racists do not speak for all of us. We do that by sending messages of love and support while also acknowledging that we have a lot of work to do. If we truly believe that the racism in our region represents the proverbially "vocal minority," then it is the responsibility of the majority to speak louder — much, much louder. That means accepting and acting on the concerns of our neighbors, without questioning their feelings and experiences.

We are asking you to step up. We are calling on you to make a public statement and to act.

1. Address the sidewalk chalk and explain why it was removed.

2. Declare that throughout the month of July, Saranac Lake will waive all permitting for temporary flyers, posters, and banners to spread messages of love, hope, and inclusion for our diverse neighbors.

In closing, we state that our actions on July 9 were taken as citizens of Saranac Lake — not on behalf of any organizations or groups.

We write to thank you, the Saranac Lake Village Board of Trustees, for your swift response to our letter dated Friday, July 10, concerning the removal of chalk messages and flyers promoting love and support for Adirondack Diversity Initiative Director Nicky Hylton-Patterson and condemning racism in our community.

We acknowledge that fighting racism, both here in Saranac Lake and across the country, is hard work, and it will take far, far more than public messages to bring about real change. We are all learning together as we go.

We have seen proposals from Trustee Rich Shapiro on how to move forward as it relates to allowing sidewalk chalk art in front of businesses with their permission, and a proposed chalk-in in which the village would invite people to do sidewalk chalk to spread messages of peace, love, and inclusion. We endorse these ideas and offer two additional suggestions — please note that these are ideas for how we can work together, not demands:

- Endorse an "event" through the end of July. The focus of this public art event would be to denounce racism in our communities, allowing residents to use public spaces — sidewalks, parks, the town hall — to spread messages of love and antiracism.
- Provide permission for 5,193 signs to be hung throughout the village, one per resident.

We welcome your input on these ideas. Our primary goal is to create space in the village for these expressions without concerns over code violations.

Additionally, we thank you for committing to work with ADI. Some of us are directly involved with the initiative, but we stress again that our actions were taken independently of any one group or organization. Shaun Kittle and Chris Morris are members of ADI's Core Team and will facilitate meetings or discussions with that group going forward.

Your community will support you and back your efforts.

We also seek counsel on how this will be addressed at the village meeting, either during public comment or as an agenda item. We ask this because we want to work together to find a solution, and because we want to be sure that we are not positioned as a group of vigilantes seeking to seed dissent. We are parents of young children, we are taxpayers, and we are voters. We work in Saranac Lake, many of us in multiple jobs. We are volunteer coaches for school children, we serve on boards and committees. We share your goals and vision for Saranac Lake: a thriving, welcoming, and inclusive community.

The goal of our actions on Thursday night was to show Hylton-Patterson that we have her back and believe her concerns about personal safety. We wanted people in this community from diverse backgrounds to see those messages as well. Again, we offer our sincere thanks to the board for acknowledging our intent.

We also stress that we believe in freedom of speech. We understand that this extends to many viewpoints and we don't wish for the village to censor anyone — unless those viewpoints are based on hate.

We are committed to working together. Thank you.

I. Outline Recommendations

During this public comment High Peaks DSA and Sunrise Adirondacks will share research that supports our recommendations to the village board to address racism as a public health crisis, through concrete policy initiatives that will have lasting material impacts.

We recommend the following actions:

1. Addressing the use of the commons as a space for the expression of free speech, excluding hate speech, which is not protected by the law.
2. A statement released by the Village Board demanding clemency for the elders facing unjust death penalties at Adirondack Correctional.
3. An immediate stop to the development of the Crisis Pregnancy Center in Saranac Lake.
4. The creation of a Community Health Worker Program.

The Regional Office of Sustainable Tourism (ROOST) recently purchased banners for downtown Saranac Lake that read "Racism is a Public Health Crisis." While we are glad to see the village making an effort to comment on concerns about race and racism that have swept the nation and our village, we have some input on how to take action that will create positive change in our community.

The message put forth into our village points to racism as a public health crisis, we agree. Healthcare in the Tri-Lakes is a patchwork of services, disconnected, and sometimes inadequate. Fewer primary care providers are available. Before Covid-19 came on the scene there was already a public health crisis that exacerbated systemic racism in our community. The saying goes "A rising tide lifts all ships," we are asking the village to support their declaration that "Racism is a public health crisis" with action.

Response to mental health and substance abuse problems in our village often fall onto the police department, who are not trained to deal with these issues and are not connected to healthcare providers. COVID-19 and the economic fallout will accelerate the public health crisis in our community, increasing the need for our police force to respond to public health calls. Racism is a public health crisis, yet we call the police.

There has been hesitance to address public health within the village because we currently have county health departments. There is, in fact, legal precedence in NY state for villages to implement their own public health initiatives and programs alongside county programs. This is found in NY Consolidated Law, Public Health, Article 3, Title 1, Sections 302 through 311. Our recommendations do not duplicate county services, but rather, supplement them to guarantee

that Saranac Lake residents will receive the same quality care that we deserve, regardless of which side of the village we live in. No one should receive lesser services because they happen to live in one county or the other, or one town or the other.

II. Provide Evidence and Facts:

Evidence and Facts for the creation of a Community Health Worker Program

The following facts, sourced from the Adirondack Health's Community Health Needs Assessment and Community Health Action Plan 2019-2021 (2019) and the Adirondack Rural Health Network, showcase disparities in health-care access our community currently faces and highlights that BIPOC are more likely to be affected by them.

1. "Health disparities adversely affect groups of people who've encountered systemic barriers to health due to characteristics historically linked to discrimination or exclusion...including race, ethnicity, socioeconomic status, gender, disability, sexual orientation, gender identity among others."
2. "Relative to upstate New York and New York State as a whole, the Adirondack region is characterized by lower educational attainment, higher unemployment rates."
3. "Relative to upstate New York and New York State as a whole, the Adirondack region is characterized by an aging population, higher disability rates."
4. "Relative to upstate New York and New York State as a whole, the Adirondack region is characterized by lower household incomes, higher poverty rates, and a vastly rural composition."
5. "Mental health and substance abuse are significant issues, affecting at least one third of the Medicaid population, and driving significant emergency department utilization across the region."
6. "Poverty in the Adirondacks is exceptionally severe."

We know the Village Board and citizens of Saranac Lake are seeking long-term interventions to the public health crisis of systemic racism, and one such solution is the proposed creation of a municipally-funded Community Health Worker Program that staffs culturally competent Community Health Workers.

There are people throughout our community who have personal experiences, ideas and expertise that can help guide a positive and productive response to recent events within a week's time... we can set a precedent as to how a small rural village not only supports diversity and inclusion with their public statements but can also move to a begin action in short order. Whose strength lies in being nimble and able to act on its values in ways that its larger, more urban neighbors cannot .

I will urge them to call these working groups to order as opportunities for swift action wherein all residents can actively and enthusiastically contribute their various expertise and resources to the causes of racism, inequity and public health we find ourselves in today. This is an urgent crisis that needs to be treated as such. Please act as though you might when a sewer main has broken.

I will underscore that It is difficult to know what that next right thing is in these trying times; but I think we can all agree that no singular poster or piece of chalk art, no singular training on diversity and no singular approach to combating issues of public health is going to get us where we need to be.

Whatever measures you take this week will similarly still not be enough.

I believe I need to do better, that we can all do better.

Part of "doing better" needs to **include enacting a swift response**. None of these issues can wait.

Taking the suggestions of our local health care professionals, we want to see a commitment from the Saranac Lake Village Board to hire two full-time public health officers as the next step in fighting racism and meeting the needs' of our entire community.

CHWs usually share ethnicity, language, socioeconomic status, values, and life experiences with the community members they serve. CHWs are:

- Selected by the community
- Culturally competent
- Responsive to the needs of community members
- Trained in context of health interventions
- Recognized by health services and certification authorities
- Not necessarily certified as professional or paraprofessional

CHWs and their duties are as diverse as the communities they serve, and CHWs are dependent on those communities for support.

The Federal Office of Rural Health Policy funded rural communities to implement community health worker (CHW) programs as part of the [Section 330A Outreach Authority](#) program. This program focuses on reducing healthcare disparities and expanding healthcare services in rural areas. Some Medicaid reimbursement is available through New York State for Community Health Worker Programs.

These programs have been successful in rural places across the US such as Kodiak, AK; the Mississippi Delta, and Hatch, NM. We have provided the board with a detailed toolkit that provides examples of successful CHW programs across the country and a variety of guidelines on developing and implementing such a program to ensure it is sustainable, effective, and inclusive.

exclusively for older and sick incarcerated people as part of the state prison system's [COVID reopening plan](#). Many of the incarcerated people came from [Fishkill](#) and [Otisville](#) Correctional Facilities, which have seen more COVID-19 cases and deaths than the large majority of prisons across the state. Incarcerated people were not tested before being transferred or upon immediate arrival to Adirondack Correctional Facility. The Facility [only began testing people several weeks after the](#) transfers began. As of July 10th, DOCCS has confirmed [two cases of COVID-19](#), putting everyone incarcerated at the facility, prison staff, and the larger community at serious risk.

Statistics, recently published in Forbes, show people who are incarcerated are [550% more likely to contract Covid-19, and are 300% more likely to die from Covid-19](#). We have seen this play out in devastating ways at San Quentin Prison in the San Francisco Bay, where thousands of inmates and correctional officers have contracted the virus and the outbreak has attracted national headlines. Adirondack Correctional is staffed by a number of residents of Saranac Lake. They are at risk, our community is at risk of higher exposure and transmission of COVID-19. The continued incarceration of individuals, primarily black and brown men, who were not sentenced to death but are now terrified for their lives is inhumane. Not a single elected official in the region has yet condemned this move, we hope that the Village Board will set an example by speaking up.

Evidence and facts to support an immediate stop to the development of the Crisis Pregnancy Center in Saranac Lake

We condemn the implementation of a Crisis Pregnancy Center, CPC, in Saranac Lake as it perpetuates the racial disparities in the public health systems in our community.

- 40% of women between age 18-44 in our counties haven't had a preventative medical visit in the past year. CPCs don't provide medical care (only ultrasounds); instead they try to get women to delay having an abortion. Sexually active women can't walk into a CPC and expect to get information about contraceptives.
- In 2018, the maternal mortality rate among black women was 37.1 per 100,000 births – about 2.5 times higher than the rate of 14.7 per 100,000 births among white women
- Black women are 2 to 6 times more likely to die from complications of pregnancy than white women, depending on where they live

- Minority women and adolescent females of all races and ethnicities are disproportionately affected by unintended pregnancy in the United States. The rates of unintended pregnancies in Franklin and Essex counties are higher than the average in NY state.
 - They are less likely to have health insurance or consistent access to healthcare, and therefore birth control
 - Black women are having a [more difficult time getting contraceptives](#) because of the pandemic

In Wake of Another Incarcerated Older Person Testing Positive for COVID-19 at New Prison Nursing Home, Advocates & NY State Health Committee Chairs Host Press Conference Calling on Gov. Cuomo to Grant Emergency Clemencies

The Group Called on Cuomo to Release All Older People From the Prison and for NY State to Pass Elder Parole and Fair and Timely Parole Bills

(New York) -- July 6, 2020 -- The Chairs of the New York State Senate and Assembly Health Committees, advocates, and the sister of a person currently incarcerated at New York's new prison nursing home at Adirondack Correctional Facility hosted a virtual press conference just hours after [breaking news](#) from *The Adirondack Daily Enterprise* that another incarcerated person at the facility tested positive for COVID-19. The group called on Governor Cuomo to grant life saving clemencies to everyone at the facility in the interest of public health and racial

justice. The group also called for the passage of the Elder Parole and Fair and Timely Parole bills.

On June 2nd, Governor Cuomo emptied Adirondack Correctional Facility to create a [new prison nursing home](#) exclusively for older and sick incarcerated people as part of the state prison system's [COVID reopening plan](#). A majority of the people first transferred to the facility are [Black people who have already served a decade or more in prison](#) and from downstate New York. Some of the newly transferred incarcerated people have [families so far away](#) that they'll no longer be able to visit. Many of the incarcerated people came from [Fishkill](#) and [Otisville](#) Correctional Facilities, which have seen more COVID-19 cases and deaths than the large majority of prisons across the state. Incarcerated people were not tested before being transferred or upon immediate arrival to Adirondack. The Facility [only began testing people several weeks after the](#) transfers began. Just days after the tests were administered, on July 8th, the Department of Corrections and Community Supervision (DOCCS) confirmed that [one person at the facility tested positive](#) for the virus. Today, on July 10th, DOCCS confirmed that [another person has tested positive](#), putting everyone incarcerated at the facility, prison staff, and the community at large, at serious risk.

Soon after the prison nursing home was created, [80 New York statewide and local advocacy organizations sent a letter](#) to Governor Cuomo, Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins and Assembly Speaker Carl Heastie, demanding the release of everyone at the facility in the interest of public health and racial justice. The letter called on Cuomo to grant clemency to everyone incarcerated at the facility and to minimally commute everyone's sentences to allow them to appear in front of the Parole Board for a chance at release. The letter also called on state lawmakers to pass Elder Parole and Fair and Timely Parole knowing [Cuomo's dismal record on clemencies](#).

[Elder Parole](#) would allow the State Board of Parole to provide an evaluation for potential parole release to incarcerated people aged 55 and older who have already served 15 or more years, including some of the state's oldest and most medically vulnerable incarcerated people. [Fair and Timely Parole](#) would provide more meaningful parole reviews for incarcerated people who are already parole eligible, and would ensure that their release decisions are based more on rehabilitation than on the nature of people's crimes.

Speakers at the press conference said the following:

Jose Saldana, Director of the Release Aging People in Prison (RAPP) Campaign, who served 38 years in prison, said, "The Governor does not value the humanity of those who are

incarcerated. If the Governor fails to act, then the legislature needs to step in. The only humane solution to this potential catastrophe is to release people.”

New York State Senate Health Committee Chair, Gustavo Rivera, said, “We’re here to say clearly, that the Governor can and should act immediately. We’re asking for the Governor to release the people at this facility. Many have already served long prison terms. All are at real risk and we need to release them so they’re out of risk.”

New York State Assembly Health Committee Chair, Richard Gottfried, said, “The notion that the state is transferring incarcerated people to a prison nursing home by the Canadian border is outrageous. We knew prison healthcare was terrible even before the pandemic. We need to take action now by passing Elder Parole and my bill to give the Health Department oversight of DOCCS healthcare during infectious disease outbreaks.”

Darlene MacKenzie, whose brother is currently incarcerated at Adirondack Correctional Facility, said, “I need my brother to come home. I worry about him everyday, and especially now that COVID-19 is in the prison. We need to release the elderly from prison. They’re human beings. Something needs to happen. We can’t lose our loved ones in prison.”

Jane Haugh, North Country resident and Director of Wake the North Country, said, “People in the North Country are growing more and more concerned about this plan. There is no reason for these people to remain in prison. We need to release them all now.”


